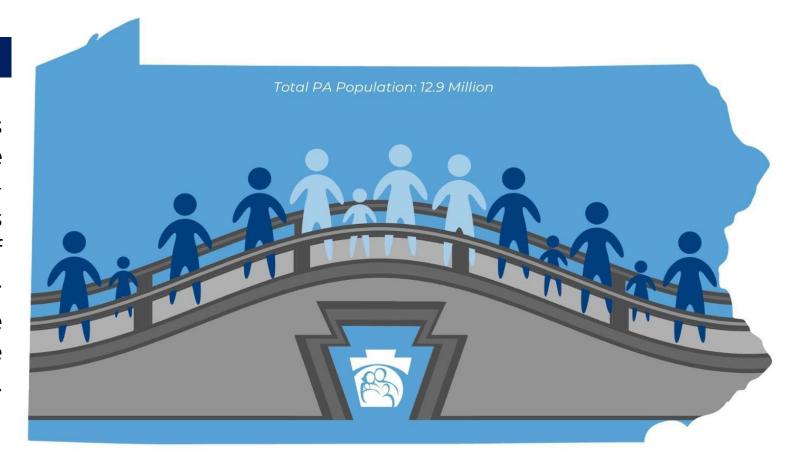

Collaborating on Commonwealth Priorities



Governor Shapiro's proposed 2024-2025 budget includes the following investments in housing and related supports, including public transportation, economic development, neighborhood revitalization, access to employment opportunities, and food security.

- Increases funding by \$10 million for the Homeless Assistance Program, where rental assistance, bridge housing, emergency shelter, eviction prevention, and other innovative supportive housing services can be provided.
- Providing \$5 million in matching funds to ensure tenants have access to legal representation in eviction proceedings and keep more Pennsylvanians in their homes.
- Increasing the cap on funding to address critical housing needs under the Pennsylvania Housing Affordability and Rehabilitation Enhancement program to \$100 million by 2027-28.
- Proposing \$5 million in flexible grant funding for communities to address immediate housing needs in times of emergency and disaster.
- Proposing \$50 million for the Whole Home Repairs program, to continue to provide direct assistance to homeowners and keep more families in their homes.
- Cutting costs for older adults and working families through expanding the Property Tax and Rent Rebate Program and the Child and Dependent Care Enhancement Tax Credit.

Pennsylvania Housing Context



WHAT IS AFFORDABLE HOUSING?

According to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), an affordable home is one where rent/mortgage costs inclusive of utility payments are 30% or less of occupants' monthly household income, regardless of income level. People who pay more are considered cost burdened.

To afford a 1 - B E D R O O M rental home at Fair Market Rent in Pennsylvania, you must have a yearly take home salary of ~\$40,000.

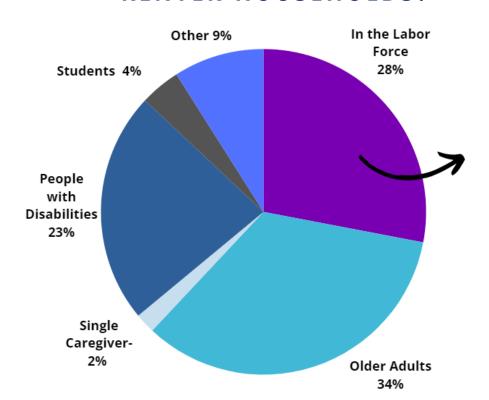

Pennsylvania Housing Context



In Pennsylvania, there is a **significant shortage of rental homes affordable and accessible to extremely low-income households**, whose incomes fall at or below the poverty guideline or 30% of their area's median income.

WHO ARE EXTREMELY LOW-INCOME RENTER HOUSEHOLDS?



ALICE HOUSEHOLDS

ALICE, a United Way acronym which stands for Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed, represents the increasing number of individuals and families who work, but are unable to meet their basic needs, including food, childcare, housing, health care and transportation.

- Many extremely low-income households are severely housing costburdened, spending more than half of their income on housing.
- Severely cost-burdened households are more likely than other renters to sacrifice other necessities like healthy food and healthcare to pay their rent, and to experience unstable housing situations like evictions.

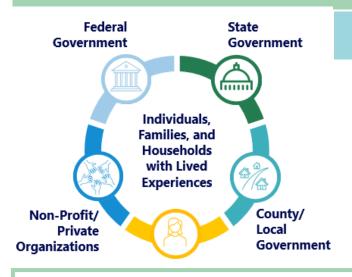

I have been on a waiting list for subsidized or permanent supportive housing – 38 respondents

I have struggled to find housing I can afford that meets the needs of my family, including children or elders – 44 respondents

I have lived in a group shelter designed to provide temporary housing – 20 respondents

I have **not had a safe and stable place to sleep** at night – **35 respondents**

I have needed help finding housing I can afford but did not know where to go – 48 respondents

37% of respondents currently **experience housing cost burden** (pay more than 30% of income on housing costs).

I have **experienced discrimination** by a landlord, property manager, real estate agent, or mortgage lender **when looking for housing – 28 respondents**

struggled to find decent quality housing I can afford in a safe neighborhood with access to the services and resources I need – 60 respondents

Feedback Survey Responses: Identifying Housing Needs

Question: Please **select up to five housing issues** most in need of attention in the Pennsylvania community where you live or work in the housing sector.

Top Responses:

- 1. Increase affordable housing for families **193 respondents**
- 2. Increase available housing for people with low credit scores, previous evictions, or criminal records **115 respondents**
- 3. Increase affordable housing with supportive services for homeless individuals and families 114 respondents
- 4. Increase affordable housing for seniors **110 respondents**
- 5. Offer incentives to redevelop vacant, abandoned, or delinquent properties **108 respondents**
- 6. Increase affordable housing with supportive services for people with disabilities 108 respondents
- 7. Increase collaboration between levels of government, private businesses, and nonprofit organizations to better serve Pennsylvanians' housing needs **92 respondents**
- Increase affordable housing in high-opportunity neighborhoods (e.g., high-quality schools, access to public transportation and essential services, close to public facilities like parks, community centers, and libraries) – 91 respondents
- 9. Preserve affordable housing options in areas where housing costs are increasing rapidly **89 respondents**
- 10. Increase available rental housing for people using Housing Choice Vouchers **79 respondents**
- 11. Provide short-term assistance with rent/mortgage/utility payments **77 respondents**
- 12. Provide assistance for property owners to repair/modernize affordable rental housing **62 respondents**

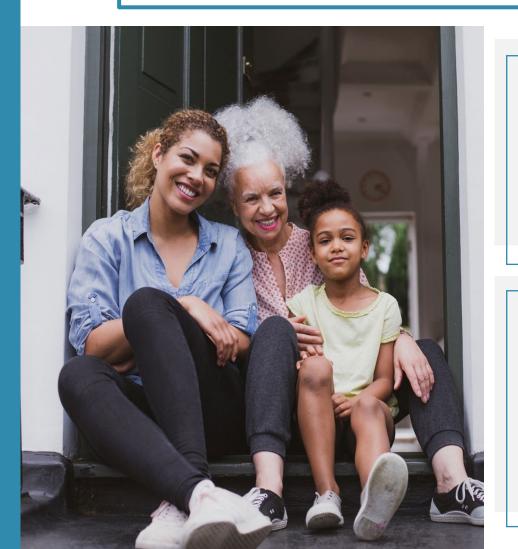




Housing Potential Populations & Services



The goal of housing supports is to ensure stable housing as a **foundation for overall health and well-being.**



POTENTIAL POPULATIONS

People experiencing homelessness who:

- Have serious mental illness or a substance use disorder
- Are pregnant or in the 12-month postpartum period
- Are identified for reentry supports, including those at risk of homelessness
- Have a chronic health condition (to be defined)

HOUSING SERVICES

- 1. Connect people to existing housing supports and services.
- 2. Provide help during transitions with moving expenses and necessary household items like, pots and pans, furniture, and air conditioning units.
- 3. Provide short-term help paying rent.
- 4. Provide education and support to keep housing.

Proposed Housing User Path



Keystones of Health provides a suite of housing supports to use in coordination with case management. It provides short-term transition assistance to establish housing and connections to existing programs for sustainability. Individuals may follow the full path or receive a subset according to their plan of care.

Who is eligible?

Medicaid beneficiaries experiencing homelessness*, or at-risk of experiencing homelessness following release from a correctional facility, who also have a clinical risk factor such as pregnancy, serious mental illness, substance use disorder, or a chronic health condition.

One-time transition start-up services to support individuals to secure and establish a home.

Individual receives rental subsidies, either as rental assistance or temporary housing, for up to 6 months.

Case management provides support during this time to connect the individual to longer-term assistance.

Individual receives education and guidance on **tenant rights and eviction mitigation support** as needed to sustain tenancy.

HRSN Screening finds an individual is eligible for Keystones of Health Housing Supports and refers

them to case management.

Case management develops a plan of care and authorizes services. Case management connects the individual with community housing specialists and pretenancy and transition services.

*Experiencing homelessness defined as living without shelter, in homeless shelters, or in structures not intended for human habitation
